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Message from the Dean

AN EXCITING YEAR

In 2011-2012, the Faculty of Social Sciences experienced another exciting year. In 2012, for the first time in its history, the Faculty was united under one roof. Our new 15-storey building, boasting a surface area of 25,299 square metres (272,318 square feet) is connected by several walkways to Vanier Hall, where the School of Psychology is located, and brings together the Faculty of Social Sciences' nine academic units (departments, schools and an institute) as well as five research centres. The Faculty of Social Sciences building is far more than just a spectacular architectural jewel; it also meets LEED environmental guidelines, which correspond to the Faculty's values and the University's formal commitment to sustainable development.

The official opening of the new Social Sciences Building took place on October 19, 2012. The inauguration was attended by federal and provincial dignitaries, the building's designers and many members of the University of Ottawa community. This event also kicked off the Faculty's year-long program of conferences, panels and receptions that celebrated the coming together of the Faculty of Social Sciences and its interdisciplinary nature.

LOOKING AHEAD

In December, we adopted the Faculty of Social Sciences' strategic plan, which defines our place in the University's *Destination 20/20* strategic plan. We are excited about the initiatives that we have planned to meet our goals of providing a rich and inspiring student experience, sharing the Faculty's research excellence, increasing our commitment to the Francophonie and bilingualism through our programs and research, and developing leaders through internationalization. Many of our initiatives involve collaboration with the community and our alumni.

I am confident that we will maintain our momentum. We are cultivating a sense of belonging among our students and alumni. I hope that you share my pride in this faculty and its continuous innovation in both teaching and research.

Messages from the Vice-Deans

After 10 years of spectacular growth in our undergraduate student population, we turned the corner in 2011-2012 and it is now time for more moderate growth. The Office of the Vice-Dean of Undergraduate Studies undertook a series of projects that focussed mainly on establishing a welcoming culture, one that offers guidance. Some projects aim to facilitate our students' transition to university studies and to develop their sense of belonging; others offer our students experiential learning to ensure their academic success. Some noteworthy initiatives include the appointment of a first- and second-year student academic adviser, who will work closely with the Mentoring Centre; a pilot project to welcome and provide language support for international students; and a pilot project to integrate the various forms of knowledge and learning gathered by students returning from internships and field research courses. Through these projects, the Office of the Vice-Dean of Undergraduate Studies is maintaining its reputation as a University leader when it comes to initiatives that address the student experience. We are beginning a cycle in which we will prioritize initiatives aimed at retaining our students and helping them to succeed, whatever their background. Our team is working to foster our students' desire to do well.

With this in mind, we will look at recruitment and guidance strategies, particularly for Francophone students, as well as how to increase and diversify mentoring services, for all sessions and by program of study.

History of the Faculty and its academic units

The social sciences have enjoyed a distinguished history at the University of Ottawa, one that begins with the creation of the School of Political Science in 1936. Over time, the founding disciplines, such as political science and psychology, have become the heart of the Faculty; however, they were established before the Faculty itself existed. It was not until 1955, with the addition of the Department of Economics, the Department of Sociology, and the Department of Political Science, that the Faculty of Social Sciences was formed. In the following decades, from 1968 to 2008, the Faculty grew by six more academic units (see timeline to right) to its current state as a faculty with nine units, including departments, two schools and an institute, all of which foster interdisciplinary work.

Our students

In less than 10 years, the total number of registrations at the Faculty has more than doubled. The creation of our two newest schools, namely the Graduate School of Public and International Affairs in 2007 and the School of International Development and Global Studies in 2008, in addition to unique interdisciplinary programs, such as the Honours BSocSc in International Development and Globalization, have contributed to this increase.

The remarkable growth in our graduate studies programs can be readily attributed to their quality and variety. In 2013, we will see the arrival of the first doctoral cohort enrolled in our new bilingual PhD in International Development, one of the only programs offered in this field in Canada.

The student experience

FSS+

FSS+ is a unique program designed to help first-year social sciences students adapt to university studies. This program not only allows students to take at least three courses per session with the same group of peers, but also offers study groups, mentors, workshops and special events.

SCS1150/1550

The Introduction to *Studying the Social Sciences* seminar course has been offered to first-year students since 2006. It teaches students the work methods needed for academic success, including time management, and how to read and write text summaries, outlines, bibliographies, and statistical tables. Every professor introduces a specific theme for discussion in classes that are limited to 30 students. Twenty-one seminar courses were delivered in 2011-2012.

DIRECTED RESEARCH PROJECTS FOR FOURTH-YEAR STUDENTS

The Faculty provides all its fourth-year students with various opportunities to work closely with professors on actual research projects. This experience helps students decide whether to pursue graduate school or move directly into the workplace.

PREPARING DOCTORAL CANDIDATES FOR THE JOB MARKET

As they prepare for the job market, our doctoral students can now set up a Web page that showcases their research and is linked to their academic unit's site. These pages are appealing to potential employers interested in specific areas of expertise.

CO-OP PROGRAMS

Several programs at the Faculty offer a co-operative education stream. By alternating between paid work terms and study sessions, students gain practical experience in their field. CO-OP placements are also offered at the graduate level in programs such as public and international affairs, globalization and international development, as well as economics.

FRENCH IMMERSION STUDIES

The French Immersion stream allows students to take some of their undergraduate courses in French which, in turn, allows them to achieve an advanced level of French-language fluency in their field of studies. Nearly all of the Faculty's programs offer French Immersion. During the 2011-2012 academic year, 579 students benefitted from this opportunity.

COMMUNITY SERVICE LEARNING

Many professors include a community service learning (CSL) component in their teaching. This teaching approach allows students to gain a better understanding of concepts taught in class by volunteering in a community-based organization.

Professors who use CSL to complement their classes teach courses that range from public administration, anthropology, international development and globalization, women's studies, gerontology, psychology, economics, political science, social work, and sociology. In 2011-2012, the Faculty of Social Sciences offered 36 courses that included a CSL option.

PROFESSIONAL TRAINING PROGRAM FOR TEACHING ASSISTANTS

In 2011, the Faculty of Social Sciences partnered with the Centre for University Teaching (CUT) to create a professional training program for teaching assistants. This training program aims to increase appreciation for the work done by teaching assistants and highlight the professional nature of the training they are given.



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International component

As study abroad becomes an increasingly valuable asset, international learning experiences are playing a greater role in the Faculty's academic programs. The Faculty offers several international opportunities.

INTERNATIONAL INTERNSHIPS

Students can test their ability to handle activities in the field during a 12-week **international** internship in their program. These internships are found in all programs offered by the Faculty. In order to prepare students for the challenges of these internships, the Faculty provides them with pre-departure training sessions and a post-internship reintegration workshop.

Undergraduate students also have a chance to earn six additional credits for their internship by completing two intensive courses after their internship. The first is an internship integration workshop, while the second is a directed research course that deals with an issue encountered during the internship. Registration in these courses allows students to maintain their full-time status while offering university-level support.

FIELD RESEARCH COURSES

Students enrolled in FSS undergraduate or master's programs may also take courses abroad. Students and their professors attend lectures by professionals and professors in the host country. They also visit local organizations and meet a variety of stake-holders. These **field research courses** allow students to apply the knowledge, tools and techniques they acquired in their methodology courses, while also permitting them to study in depth one or more of the issues faced by the host country. In May 2012, 52 students participated in a field research course.

INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGES

University of Ottawa students have the option of completing one session or one year of study in another country. Participating in an **international exchange** exposes students to alternative approaches in a given field. The majority of students who take advantage of this activity are from the Faculty of Social Sciences. In 2011-2012, 94 students took part in an international exchange.

COTUTELLE PROGRAMS

Cotutelle programs offer doctoral candidates the opportunity to learn in two different research and graduate study environments. Through cotutelle doctoral programs, candidates are able to draw upon the unique research expertise found in two different institutions in support of their research.

FIELD RESEARCH (DATA COLLECTION)

Graduate students who wish to pursue research outside of Canada can obtain an FSS travel grant of up to \$2,000. The purpose of this financial assistance is to help students conduct research internationally in order to **gather data** for their theses or acquire in-depth knowledge of their research topic.

MODEL UNITED NATIONS COURSE

In the Model United Nations course, undergraduate students acquire additional experience and knowledge of international diplomacy and acquaint themselves with current international issues. The highlight of the course is participation in the prestigious National **Model United Nations** event held annually in New York City. The 2012 delegation represented France and received the "Distinguished Delegation Award". This is the second of three prizes awarded to the best delegations taking part in the NMUN.

Financial support

In addition to University of Ottawa admission scholarships, undergraduate students at the Faculty of Social Sciences may be eligible for the **Dean's Excellence Award**, and can also apply for Faculty **scholarships** and **bursaries**, **merit scholarships** and **mobility bursaries**, which, in 2011-2012, totalled more than \$250,000.

As for our graduate students, over 60% of master's level students and over 85% of PhD level students receive financial support, which helps them keep their budgets on track while they focus squarely on their academic goals. In 2012, 113 of our graduate students received an external bursary from the Tri-council, OGS, FRQ, or other agency. The Faculty of Social Sciences also has a special annual budget designed to offer financial support to international students. In 2012, we contributed some \$160,000 towards foreign tuition fees to supplement the contributions of academic units through assistantships and other financial resources.

In addition to admission and merit scholarships, the Faculty of Social Sciences allocated more than \$ 5.5 million to teaching and research assistantships for the 2012-2013 academic year.

Our research: creating knowledge, making discoveries and fostering innovation

The Faculty of Social Sciences has made research the centrepiece of its academic programs and the focal point of strategic areas of development, enriching the quality of instruction and learning for the student population.

Our Faculty builds on the strength of Canada's two major intellectual traditions, Anglophone and Francophone, while also standing as a centre of excellence in knowledge creation, research and training. Driven by both disciplinary and interdisciplinary perspectives, research at the Faculty is at once rich, innovative and varied, contributing to the depth and breadth of discussions on current issues here and elsewhere. And whether fundamental, theoretical, applied or action-oriented, this research stems from proven expertise—most notably in Canada's Francophonie—and greatly influences individual communities and society in general.

In step with contemporary society on both the national and international fronts, the Faculty of Social Sciences fosters social innovation, creates and shares knowledge, promotes public policy development and builds research partnerships with public and private sectors and with community organizations.

Research Chairs

Research chairs are vital in promoting a discipline, a strategic area or an experienced researcher's program. Our chair holders are always pushing the boundaries of knowledge in their respective fields. Chair holders are selected on the basis of their research program, sustained contribution to education, mentoring of students and impact in their field.





Our alumni

During 2012, the Faculty of Social Sciences pursued its goal of strengthening its relationships with its 31,111 alumni scattered across more than 104 countries. Around the world, our graduates are our best ambassadors. No matter where they live, they have the potential, through their diverse experiences, to enhance the reputation of our Faculty and enrich life on campus. First held in 2012, the series entitled "Deconstructing Success: How our Social Sciences Alumni Built their Careers" is the best example of this fact. Presented by the Faculty of Social Sciences, this series of lectures featured ten Social Sciences alumni who have enjoyed successful careers, including an ambassador, MPs, two assistant deputy ministers and a VP at BMO Nesbitt Burns. These speakers described their careers from their time as students to today, and provided anecdotes and practical advice to students on the issues that were vital to their success.

In 2012, we introduced the first annual reunion of uOttawa alumni to take place during the spring. Spring Alumni Weekend 2012 was a chance for many former classmates to reconnect and for alumni to attend lectures, participate in family activities and attend the *Destination 2012* gala, which was concluded with the uOttawa Alumni Association's presentation of its Awards of Excellence. Some highlights of this weekend included the twentieth anniversary of the School of Social Work and a reunion of the Master's in Applied Criminology—Class of '72. Alumni from all over Canada gathered here for their reunion and happily renewed friendships, some of which spanned over 40 years.



We intend to continue to build on this momentum in 2013. To do so, we wish to be more attentive to what our alumni have to say and to involve them more frequently in

our activities.

Our professors

The Faculty of Social Sciences has 272 full, associate, assistant and replacement professors. As experts in their fields, they conduct fundamental and applied research on a national and international scale in a variety of areas that generate worldwide interest. In addition, our professors help develop social policy, collaborate with government departments, paragovernmental agencies and community organizations, and actively participate in public debate.

The Faculty also currently includes more than 30 senior fellows and scholars-in-residence who have acquired many years of practical experience in government departments, research centres and NGOs in Canada and abroad.
